Updates from the Riverside Hub

Students in the Riverside hub had a lovely summer term filled with a variety of community activities. Our students continue to explore their interests through different work experience, leisure activities and enrichment activities organised by the Qualified Teacher and Teaching and Learning Mentors. We have been on trips to the museum, parks, shopping centres and cinemas in order to expand our students' interests. Our students also participated in work experience in different settings, such as a library, a charity shop, a perfume shop, a food market and a city farm. Our aim is to expand their interests as much as possible so they have the tools to make their choice for their future life.

In addition, they are all progressing through their IEP targets to make sure they are following the curriculum. Our Mentors plan the day with their students and make sure all of the targets are being implemented within the activities, so that they can practise the targets in the natural environment. We are all very proud of them!







Updates from the Wandsworth Hub

What a fantastic last term we have had at Wandsworth Hub! All students have been working really hard on their targets; we have secured new work-experience placements at a farm, library and in an office that students have been attending weekly. A big focus this term was on communication; and with the help of SaLT we have seen a drastic improvement across the whole hub.

Additionally, we have been working on peer interaction and students have loved exploring leisure activities together. We sadly say goodbye to 4 great students who are on to their post 25 settings; they will be greatly missed!








Updates from the Hammersmith Hub

This term we focused on using public transport, doing exercise outdoors and cooking healthy food. Many students are now using public transport with their Mentors to get to their activities: gym, swimming lessons and music sessions. It was great to see them getting more independent in using oyster cards and tolerating busy locations.

To make the best of the nice weather, fitness classes were planned in different outdoor gyms both with other students and with their Mentors. It was a great opportunity to access new locations and to teach personal care targets like applying deodorant.

This term students joined a music school in Shepherd's Bush. They have played different instruments, sung together and followed their teacher's instructions. It's a great opportunity for them to socialise and interact with each other.

Last but not least, this term students have expanded their cooking skills making themselves fruit salads and baking healthy desserts. Students went to the shop to choose their favourite fruits, before going back to the Hub to wash and cut the fruit before mixing all together. Others have been developing their baking skills learning how to use measuring cups before enjoying their creations on the patio.

BeyondAutism Professional Conference

This year we held our professional conference in person for the first time, on 20th and 21st June, at the University of Suffolk.

Our theme, around the realities of inclusion of autistic and disabled individuals in society, brought together a unique mix of researchers, practitioners and those with lived experience. This resulted in an event that delved deep into the theme across multiple sections of society with a focus on what changes we can make to improve the situation.

With over 50% of our speakers bringing their own lived experiences, it led to some great discussions: how real is the picture we have of inclusion? Why is the system set up so that to get support you need an assessment or diagnosis? How can we make the huge cultural and mindset shift so that we see difference as a positive, and have environments that are set up to enable all to succeed?
